## What is it?

The Project seeks to promote positive activities which will help new arrivals to fit in and become effective members of British society and greatly help community cohesion in Netherton.

## Vision for the Project

- To explore collectively ways of engaging with migrant communities within each respective area.
- To improve the life chances of asylum seekers and refugees.
- To work with respective tenants and residents associations to address tensions between different communities on respective estates.
- Strengthen the community and get people to know more about different classification of migrants.
- Encourage dialogue between asylum seekers / refugees and the wider communities the project being the interface with the general public.
- Reduce fear and anxiety and enable people to feel positive about diversity and proud of their community.
